

## About us

Wytham Hall is a small supported housing charity in a pleasant and leafy residential area of Maida Vale.

We provide housing and support for up to 25 members of the homeless community. If all you want is housing, then we are not for you.

When someone becomes homeless and is seeking help to get back indoors and back on their feet, then it is likely that it would be a larger organisation that they would get involved with first.

Only after such organisations have assessed your needs, would they refer you to an organisation like ours.

If we think that we can help, then we would provide you with a room of your own, help you find a way to have the rent paid, and then provide you with a key worker

Our role is to attempt to help you to get to a point where you no longer need our support and can get on with your life. Some of our residents just need somewhere warm, dry and safe to live.

## What we offer

We have a small, but stable and experienced staff team. One of which would be your designated key worker.

They would meet with you at least once per month, but typically more frequently, to identify your needs and how you might most effectively address those needs.

If our staff team can provide the support needed then all well and good, but we have links with an array of external people that we can call upon when they are better equipped to support you than ourselves.

## A resident's story

"When I became street homeless I was clueless as to how to exist and I knew nothing of the services that were on offer to help and support me.

Eventually with the help of a worker from St. Mungo's I was directed to Great Chapel Street Medical Centre where my Doctor identified an increasing need to address a number of long standing and underlying health conditions.

Shortly afterwards I was offered admission to Wytham Hall and I was so glad to come here as my health was in a very poor state. The house I was admitted to gave me the opportunity to address these needs and to relax for the first time in a long time. It gave me somewhere warm, safe and dry and again I would say that it gave me somewhere to relax".
